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### Los Angeles Wheelmen VP Report - October 1, 2019

**Last Sunday:** On Sunday we held the Grand Tour Lite. This year it started in Port Hueneme and was held as a fund raiser on behalf of the Port Hueneme VFW which has provided facilities to the club for many years. The remote start and the fee no doubt limited ridership, but I think maybe around 15 riders showed up. They seemed about evenly split between the 40 mile route, the 100 mile route and the 113 mile (with difficult climb) route. I rode the 100, but never saw any of the other riders all day. However, I did glance at the registration list and I saw a few members on the list. **Leo Jarzomb** and **Rick Jacobson** were apparently on the ride. Also, at the end I saw **Thomas Knoll** who must have been a late register. It's a shame more riders didn't show up because it was one of the nicest days for a century ride I've seen in a long time. It had that autumn feeling in the air and it was a pleasant day to be riding around the Ventura County countryside. The route was nice. It spent most of it's time in the country and was a very front loaded route. By that I mean most of the climbing was in the first half. I think when I topped Grimes Canyon I was just about at the halfway point but I already had about 2800 feet out of a total 3400. That always makes the second half of the ride just that much more pleasant.

I had hoped to get a photo of a field full of pumpkins because I know they grow them in Ventura, but the route didn't take me past any. I did take this photo in Simi Valley:





**Next Sunday:** This Sunday we will be making our annual pilgrimage to Mount Wilson. We offer the usual long, medium and short routes, but only the long goes all the way up to Wilson. The medium goes about half way and the short simply rides around the Pasadena area. Talk about your front loaded routes -- almost all of the climbing is in the first half as you climb to Wilson. The return is back the way you came so the 2nd half is almost all down. This gives you something to look forward to as you climb. I always get a nice sense of accomplishment when I get to the top of Wilson. If you have never done it, you should give it a try. After all, if it really gets too hard for you, you can always simply turn around and practically coast back to the start.

**Bike Path Warning:** I just received a warning from a local bike club in the Ventura area about the bike path that runs from Ventura to Ojai. It seems transients living near the path have been causing some problems along the path. We don't get up that way very often, but if you are in the area -- beware.
