

Garmin only counted one climb on the entire ride and it was only about half a mile long in Whittier near the beginning of the ride. The rest was pretty smooth sailing. I did have trouble following the route in one spot where I have had trouble before, but now I know what the problem is. A portion of a bike path in Yorba Linda has been moved. I've made the correction for next time. Next time I'll also remember to take a break in Seal Beach before getting on the San Gabriel River for the return. That last 30 miles was almost entirely on bike paths and there was no place to get a Coke.

Next Sunday: This Sunday we will be riding a favorite of mine, but one we don't often ride -- the "Hollywood Sign Ride." There are only two routes -- a medium and long. The two stay together up to the Hollywood Sign. The medium simply returns to the start while the long does a loop out to the Valley and back. I'd like to sugarcoat this, but the reason we don't do this ride often is that it is very steep. But from the start to the top is only 10 miles and it's only the last few miles that are really tough. Go slow and rest if you want, and you can make it. The view from up there is really something to see. And the next time you look up at the sign, you can say to yourself, "I rode my bike up there." I hope to do the long, but often after making it up to the sign, I've had enough and I head for home. I look forward to seeing you out there.

Frank was a very long term member of the club having joined back in the 60's I believe. He was a very strong rider and for many years held the record for the greatest number of Grand Tour Triples ridden.
