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Hello All:

Sunday: Last Sunday we were riding "Viva San Fernando" which, not surprising, took us out to the Valley. With temperatures in the Valley predicted to be near 100, I thought there was a good chance I would be the only one at the start. I was pleasantly surprised when 5 other riders showed up. Jacques and Nancy took the medium route over to the Valley while the rest of took the long. Once in the Valley we met up and we all completed the long route which finished by going over Old Topanga to the coast. The long took us up Nichols Canyon which is very nice, but it does have a killer last tenth of a mile up to Mulholland Dr. Here is a photo Rafi took of Phil as he neared the top.



When we got down into the Valley, I was pleasantly surprised that it wasn't nearly as hot as I had expected. But it was still early. As we rode to the west end of the Valley for lunch it kept getting warmer and warmer. Fortunately, it didn't really get hot until after lunch and at that point all we had to do was the 1.5 mile climb up Old Topanga and we would be able to coast down to the cooler coast.
