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Hello All:





To my knowledge, no one rode on Saturday. On Sunday I decided to ride the Saturday route because I had ridden the Sunday route last year. It was a nice sunny day and it wasn't even very cold at the start where many years it is absolutely frigid. I was able to take off my jacket for the second half of the ride. It's a very scenic route. This Week: On Sunday we will be riding "The Amazing Maze." which starts at Pine Tree Park in Tustin. All routes proceed to the Yorba Linda / Anaheim Hills area for lunch but by different routes. As usual, the long takes a longer and more hilly route while the medium and short take shorter and less hilly routes. Our former lunch location (Worlds Best Hamburger) has closed so I have moved the lunch to a mall on Santa Ana Canyon Rd where there are actually more choices, one of which is The Habit -- (seemingly) the fastest expanding food outlet in Southern California.
