

Los Angeles Wheelmen VP Report - January 2, 2019

Hello All and Happy New Year

As I did last week, I'm sending this out a day later than usual because of the holiday.

Sunday: Last Sunday we were riding our last scheduled ride of 2018 -- "Legg Lake." I guess not many members needed one last ride to cap off the year because there were only 4 of us there. I forgot to take a photo at the start, but two of the riders had been at the ride the previous week, so here is that photo again (edited)



That's **Russ Brynes** and **Jacques Stern**. We met **Mel Cutler** shortly after we had started -- he was riding from home. Mel did the medium route which actually went past Legg Lake (which the long route did not) and he sent me this selfie from the lake.



Mel constantly impresses me. In order to get to the ride, he had to leave home before the sun was up and this time of year, it is very cold at that hour. I don't know how he does it. It was fairly cold for the ride, but at least by the time we started the sun was up and it was OK. I think my fingers quit aching after the first 5 miles. It was a nice ride although it isn't one of my favorite routes. When I got back to the Rose Bowl where we started, I did one lap around the Bowl to get up to 60 miles for a final metric century of 2018. That took me past the big tents where they were decorating floats for the parade. Quite a zoo. There were so many people there they had parked cars on the soccer fields next to the Rose Bowl. Lots of security, so I didn't get a glimpse of the floats.

New Year's Day: New Year's Day was our traditional "Kickoff Century." High winds were predicted and that apparently scared off all the riders. I was the only rider. Yes it was windy, but no where near as bad as predicted. There is a lot of talk of "fake news" these days, but I think the weathermen are often the real fake news. They tend to report the worst case scenarios. Anyway, I had a nice ride. Despite the wind, I finished about the same time I always do. Maybe that was because some of the time those winds were helping me. It was my first trip through Malibu since the fire. There are indeed long stretches where the fire burned down to the edge of PCH (and sometimes across it right down to the water's edge), but I was impressed with how few homes I saw burned -- at least right on PCH. There were a few, but I didn't take any photos because mostly they weren't very visible (Malibu residents like homes with privacy). I did take this photo:

These are fairly nice routes, but the long and medium both have the climb over and then back thru Santa Susana Pass. On the way out, the long uses Box Canyon which has a very steep section. There is talk of rain, but if there isn't any, I'll be there. I hope to see several of you out.


Next Weekend: This Saturday and Sunday we will be running our annual Janus Sequential Centuries. This is a century (or metric century) on Saturday and then a 2nd century (or metric century) on Sunday. The routes both days are the same except that on Saturday we ride them in a clockwise manner and on Sunday in the counter-clockwise direction. Few riders actually come out for both days, so don't feel you have to ride both days. Just come out for one or the other if that suits you. The full century routes are somewhat hilly with about 5000 feet of climbing each day. The metric centuries cut out much of the climbing, but on Saturday, the metric does climb Potrero -- a very tough climb. It looks like all this rain we have been having is going to end by the weekend, so I'm optimistic we will get these rides in. I definitely plan to be there Saturday and if that doesn't kill me, I might try for Sunday as well -- maybe only the metric on Sunday. But I'm slow, so I plan to start early. Most of you will probably catch me at some point. I'll keep an eye out for you.

Holiday Party: Last Saturday we held our annual Holiday Party at the Olive Garden out in the Valley. I didn't get a count, but it seemed like a pretty good crowd. We filled two long tables. Last Weekend: Last weekend was our annual running of the Janus Sequential Centuries -- back to back centuries or metric centuries on Saturday and Sunday. I went out for an early start on Saturday, but **Phil Whitworth** showed up just before I took off. He may have been the only other rider on Saturday. He told me a group of riders overtook him near the end and were at the parking lot when he finished. They may have been on our ride, but he didn't know any of them. Both Phil and I did the full century on Saturday. It was a great day for it. Not freezing cold at the start as it often is and warm enough later that I took my jacket off before the final climb up Potrero. I always consider this ride to be my annual showdown against my nemesis -- Potrero. Sometimes the hill wins and sometimes I win. I am happy to report that this year I beat the hill. That just means not stopping and not walking, but I was pleased with myself. I didn't take many photos. Here is one I took of Lake Sherwood. It appears to be completely full. I was a little surprised because it seems like the last time I saw it, it was somewhat low.



I was feeling good enough after Saturday's ride that I decided to go out on Sunday as well. But once I got there, I couldn't face another 100 miles, so I opted for doing the metric century. **Sheila Szymanski** also rode the metric and **Jacques Stern** was there to ride the full century. I took this photo, which requires some explanation.



This is on Harbor Blvd between Ventura and Oxnard.
