Sunday: Seven of us showed up at the start on Sunday, which is better than the last time when I remember riding it alone. **Phil Whitworth** took this photo:






See all the wildflowers. Also, long stretches of the river were more full than I have ever seen it. I took this photo

Next Week: On Sunday we will be riding "Winding Roads of Orange County II." The important thing to note is that while these rides start in Tustin, like so many of our Orange County rides, we will NOT be starting at Pine Tree Park. That park is still closed for renovations, so we are starting nearby at El Camino Real Park. Check the club web site for details of the location. As per usual, the long is somewhat hilly, the medium less so, and the short hardly at all. So you can pick you poison. No matter which you choose, Orange County is always a pleasant place to ride.

Bridge Finally Opening: Over two years ago the Long Beach International Gateway Bridge was completed linking downtown Long Beach to Terminal Island. You can see it as you ride down the Los Angeles River Trail. It was designed to include both bike lanes and pedestrian access. However, the bike lanes were never opened. **Nancy Domjanovich** forwarded an article to me which indicates that at long last, in May, the bike lanes will be opened. I plan to put together a ride that will go over the bridge -- probably sometime this summer. Unfortunately, there really isn't anything to see on Terminal Island and I believe the only way off the island for a bicycle will be to come back over the bridge. But, it's a pretty looking bridge so it should be an interesting ride.

Parting Shot: I was so impressed with all the water flowing down the San Gabriel River on Sunday, I took lots of photos. So here is one more of the water being let out of the Santa Fe Dam at a rate I've never seen before:
