Sunday: Our ride on Sunday was "Revel the Rollies II" which started from Tustin. We had 6 riders at the start and **Phil Whitworth** took this shot:

Rafi and Edwin actually rode from Long Beach in order to get a full 100 miles in for the day. Rafi, Edwin, Phil and David did the long route and Bill and I started out on the medium. It was pleasant riding at first, but quickly warmed up and as the medium climbed up to Cook's Corner, the heat finally got to me and I just couldn't face the coming hills as we rode through Santiago Canyon. We we turned around and had a mostly downhill ride back to the start. We got in almost as many miles as we would have if we had completed the route, but not as much climbing. Thinking About Motorcycle Gathering Places. Seeing Cook's Corner reminded me that a few years ago there was talk that Cook's was going to close. That would have eliminated another gathering place for motorcyclists. In the past they have lost a place in Carbon Canyon, a place in the middle of Bouquet Canyon, the Hidden Spring Cafe on Angeles Forest Hwy and Newcomb's Ranch on Angeles Crest. The Rock Store is still there, but the rock store hill has been closed for several years and that was one of the big draws for motorcyclists. That leaves Cook's Corner and Neptune's Net. There must be a few places I'm not familiar with, but clearly motorcyclists who want to get together and show of their bikes are falling on hard times.

This Week: We have two rides this week. First up is our annual 4th of July ride which starts from Long Beach. These are relatively short and easy routes designed to get you home in plenty of time to rest up and then go out and see some fireworks. The routes have been changed a little to now stop at a Shake Shack instead of the now closed Five Guys, but otherwise are the routes we

have been riding for years. The highlight is the trip up to the top of Signal Hill for the view and to take a group photo. That's only on the long route, but the climb up the hill really isn't all that bad and most riders do it.

Our second ride of the weekend is our regular Sunday ride. This week we will be riding "John's River Ride" which starts from Boysen Park in Anaheim. All routes ride down the Santa Ana River trail with the long and medium going all the way to the coast and then riding over to Balboa and riding the ferry to the island. Both routes then head inland back toward the start. The long takes a loop through the Tustin hills which adds some climbing besides the extra miles. The medium makes a more direct return to the start. The short simply rides down the Santa Ana river, has lunch and then returns back up the river. It is supposed to cooler this weekend, so hopefully the trip back inland to finish these routes won't be too bad.
